8:45–9:45	Teaching critical thinking is, in part, teaching students to analyze and evaluate arguments, and to evaluate the sources of information to which arguments appeal for evidential support. We will present some tips and techniques for briefly introducing students to argument analysis skills which will be useful to students both in analyzing arguments and in producing their own. We will also present some ways to quickly introduce easy-to-use techniques for helping students assess the reliability and credibility of sources of information they use in their own research, especially sources on the internet, which students tend to consult for initial research on any topic.
